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Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy

Whilst children and young people are participating in golf activities in our care, Mid Wales County Golf Association (MWCGA) has a responsibility to ensure their safety and wellbeing.

The Mid Wales County Golf Association recognises the policies of the National Governing bodies, as set in out in the "Guidelines for Safeguarding Children in Golf". The policy and supporting procedures set out a framework to fulfil our commitment to good practice and the protection of children in our care.

PRINCIPLES

- A child is defined by law as a person under the age of 18 years
- The welfare of children is paramount
- All children, regardless of their Age, Race, Religion or Belief, Disability, Sex or Sexual Orientation, have the right to protection from abuse
- All concerns and allegations of abuse and poor practice will be taken seriously and responded to swiftly and appropriately
- All children have the right to be safe
- All children have the right to be treated with dignity and respect
- The Mid Wales County Golf Association will work with children, their parents and external organisations to safeguard the welfare of children participating in golf
- We recognise the authority of the statutory agencies and are committed to complying with Local Safeguarding Children Board Guidelines (LSCB) and any documentation which supersedes these.

OBJECTIVES

When a child is involved in County activities the Mid Wales County Golf Association aims to:

- Provide a safe environment for children participating in golfing activities within a golf club environment and try to ensure that they enjoy the experience.
- Reassure parents (and carers) that their children will receive the best care
 possible whilst participating in county activities and communicate policy and
 procedure to them through website/letter/consents.
- Support adults (volunteers, PGA Professionals, coaches, members, visitors) to understand their roles and responsibilities with regard to the Duty of Care and protection of children.
- Provide appropriate level training and support to staff, volunteers and coaches to make informed and confident responses to specific child protection issues and to fulfill their role effectively
- Adopt the Children in Golf Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy and Procedures and any related policies where appropriate.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND IMPLEMENTATION

The Mid Wales County Golf Association and partner organisations will seek to promote the principles of safeguarding children by:

- Reviewing their policy and procedures every three years or whenever there is a major change in legislation. Guidance from Wales Golf and Children in Golf Strategy Group will be sought as part of the review process.
- Conducting a risk assessment of County activities with regard to safeguarding and take appropriate action to address the identified issues within suitable timescales.
- Using appropriate recruitment procedures to assess the suitability of County volunteers and staff working with children, in line with guidance from Children in Golf.
- Following National Governing Body (NGB) procedures to report concerns and allegations about the welfare of children or the behaviour of adults and ensure that all staff, volunteers, parents and children are aware of these procedures.
- Directing County officials, volunteers and coaches to appropriate safeguarding training, where this is appropriate to their role.

1. RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING

The Mid Wales County Golf Association will endeavour to ensure that all volunteers and staff working with children are suitable to do so, and that they have all the information they require to perform their job effectively and appropriately.

Each role which involves an element of responsibility with regard to children, particularly those involving the regular supervision of children, whether voluntary or paid, will be assessed to establish which qualifications, checks and other requirements are necessary. These will include the following:

- An application form (Appendix 1)
- A self-disclosure form (Appendix 2)
- References from 2 people if possible (Appendix 3)
- A signed Code of Conduct (Appendix 4)
- A Disclosure & Barring Service (DBS) check on people involved in 'regulated activity' with children. (**Appendix 10**)

Details of the requirements and the qualifications and checks of individuals will be recorded by the County Welfare Officer (CWO) /Secretary/Captain who will also hold copies of the necessary Safeguarding and Protecting Children (SPC) certificates. The nominated person will possess all relevant and appropriate contact details of all staff / volunteers and other relevant bodies.

All County officials, Volunteers and PGA Coaches will be offered access to appropriate child protection training. The Mid Wales County Golf Association recommends attendance at the sportscoachuk "SPC" workshop and will ensure that all volunteers and staff who have significant contact with children attend. Attendance at the training will be repeated every 3 years for those involved in regulated activity.

All County officials, Volunteers and PGA Coaches working with children will be asked to read and become familiar with the Mid Wales County Golf Association Safeguarding Policy and Procedures.

All volunteers and coaches involved with children will be asked to read the Mid Wales County Golf Association Code of Conduct for Adults, and sign to indicate their agreement to act in accordance with the code. The code is linked to the Mid Wales County Golf Association Disciplinary Procedures.

2. COMPLAINTS, CONCERNS AND ALLEGATIONS


- 2.1 If a player, parent/carer, County official or volunteer has a concern about the welfare of a child, or the conduct of another child/young person or an adult (whether they are a parent, coach, member, or otherwise), these concerns should be brought to the attention of the County Welfare Officer forthwith. The person reporting the concern is not required to decide whether abuse has occurred, but simply has a duty to pass information to the Welfare Officer. Please refer to Flowcharts 1 & 2 for further details (see below).
- **2.2** All concerns will be treated in confidence. Details should only be shared with those who can help with the management of the concern.
- 2.3 Concerns will be recorded on an Incident Report Form (appendix 5) and sent to the Wales Golf Safeguarding Co-ordinator and retained confidentially within the county. The WALES GOLF Safeguarding Co-ordinator will assist with completion of this form on the County's behalf if required, Tel: 01633 436040.
- 2.4 The Mid Wales County Golf Association will work with the Wales Golf and other external agencies to take appropriate action in the case of abuse or serious poor practice. The Mid Wales County Golf Association disciplinary procedures will be applied and followed where possible.
- **2.5** In the event of a child making a disclosure of any type of abuse, the following guidance is given:
 - Reassure the child that they have done the right thing to share the information
 - Do not make promises that cannot be kept, such as promising not to tell anyone else
 - Do not question the child or lead them in any way to disclose more information than they are comfortably able to: this may compromise any future action
 - Record what the child has said as soon as possible on an incident report form.

2.6 The NSPCC Helpline is available to discuss concerns regarding poor practice and abuse in confidence with members of the public. No referrals are made from the calls. Those with concerns are encouraged to use this service. The Helpline number is 0808 800 5000.

FLOWCHART 1


What to do if you are worried about what is happening to a child outside of the Club/County (but the concern is identified through the child's involvement in MWCGA County golf)

3. EMERGENCIES AND INCIDENTS

- **3.1** Parental Consent Forms (**appendix 7**) will be obtained and retained by the Mid Wales County Golf Association for all children who are participating in events or activities, or attending coaching organised by the County. These forms will be treated in confidence and only shared with those who require the information they contain to perform their role effectively.
- **3.2** In the event of a child requiring medical attention:
 - The parents will be contacted immediately.
 - In the event of failure to contact parents, the alternative emergency contacts will be used.
 - The consent form will be consulted to establish whether parents have given their consent for a club representative to act in loco parentis.
 - An adult County representative will accompany the child to seek medical attention, if appropriate, ensuring that they take the consent form with them.
 - A record of the action taken will be made and retained by a County representative.
- **3.3** Where a parent is late in collecting their child the following procedure will apply:
 - Attempt to contact the parent/carer using the contact details on the Parental Consent Form
 - Attempt to contact the first, then the second emergency contact nominated on the Consent Form
 - Wait with the young person(s) at the venue with, wherever possible, other County officials /volunteers or parents.
 - If no one is reachable, contact the County 's Welfare Officer for advice.
 - If all attempts to make contact fail, consideration should be given to contacting the police for their advice.

County officials, Volunteers and PGA Pros should try to avoid:

- Taking the child home or to another location without consent.
- Asking the child to wait in a vehicle or any location with them alone.
- Sending the child home with another person without permission.

4. SUPERVISION

- 4.1 During coaching sessions the club will endeavour to ensure that there is at least one Coach/volunteer present for every 8 children.
- **4.2** Parents will be encouraged to stay for coaching/competitions and other events where their children are of an age where their supervision is required.
- **4.3** If there are young children (under 10 years of age) attending events, activities, coaching or playing sessions they will be supervised at all times.
- **4.4** Wherever possible adults will avoid changing or showering at the same time as children but parents will be made aware that with limited changing room space there will be occasions when adults and children may need to share the facilities.
- **4.5** Parents should be aware that if children are left at a venue unsupervised, other than to attend specific coaching sessions, competitions, or other organised events, the County cannot accept supervisory responsibility.
- **4.6** Special arrangements will be made for away trips. Parents will receive full information about arrangements for any such trip and will be required to provide their consent for their child's participation.

5. GOOD PRACTICE GUIDELINES

5.1 Behaviour of adults and children

- **5.1.1** Adults who work with children are placed in a position of trust in relation to children, and therefore it is important they behave appropriately and provide a strong positive role model for children, both to protect children and those working with children from false allegations of poor practice. Codes of conduct will be issued to junior members and adults working with them to promote good practice.
- **5.1.2** The Mid Wales County Golf Association requires that all County Officials and volunteers working with children adhere to the standards set out in the Code of Conduct (appendix 4). Similarly, children are expected to follow their own code of conduct to ensure the enjoyment of all participants and assist the County in ensuring their welfare is safeguarded (appendix 4).
- **5.1.3** Parents should also work together with the Club to ensure that the safety of all children is safeguarded. A sheet on "Parental Guidance" (appendix 8) is provided to assist them in understanding how they can best assist the County.

5.2 Adults and Children playing golf together

One of the reasons for the popularity of golf is that the game is not restricted by ability, age or gender. Responsible interaction between adults and children helps bring mutual respect and understanding and will be encouraged as part of county activities. Adults should always be aware however that age related differences do exist and conduct themselves in a manner that recognises this.

5.3 Physical Contact

Physical contact with children by coaches or volunteers should always be intended to meet the needs of the child and the sport, not the adult. That is, to develop golf technique, to protect the child from injury, to provide first aid or treat an injury. It should always take place in an open environment, and should not, as a general principle, be made gratuitously or unnecessarily.

5.4 Transport

- **5.4.1** The County believes it is primarily the responsibility of parents/guardians to transport their child/children to and from events. It is not the responsibility of County volunteers or coaches to transport children and young people to and from events, activities, tournaments or matches.
- **5.4.2** The County may make arrangements for transport in exceptional circumstances, such as team events. Where this is the case, the written permission of the parents of the relevant children will be sought. The drivers used will be checked for their suitability to supervise children (see Section 1 Recruitment and Training) and their insurance arrangements verified.

5.5 Photography/ Videoing

- **5.5.1** Permission will be sought from parents prior to the publication or use of any video or photographic images of their child, for instance in newspapers, websites or for coaching purposes. The personal details of the child will not be used in any promotional material.
- **5.5.2** Any press/official photographers attending events will be required to seek permission from the county before taking photographs and also permission of parents to use the images.

5.5 Anti Bullying Procedures

5.5.1 We believe that every effort must be made to eradicate bullying in all its forms.

Bullying can be difficult to define and can take many forms which can be categorised as;

- Physical hitting, kicking, theft
- Verbal homophobic or racist remarks, threats, name calling
- Emotional isolating an individual from activities or a group
- Bullying behaviour can include online as well as offline behaviour

All forms of bullying include;

- Deliberate hostility and aggression towards an individual(s)
- A victim who is weaker and less powerful than the bully or bullies
- An outcome which is always painful and distressing for the victim

Bullying behaviour may also include;

- Other forms of violence
- Sarcasm, spreading rumours, persistent teasing, name calling, humiliation or the continual ignoring of others
- Posting of derogatory or abusive comments, videos or images on social media
- Racist behaviour including racially aggravated remarks, name-calling, racial exclusion
- Homeophobic and transphobic comments
- Sexist slurs
- Tormenting, ridiculing, humiliation
- Unwanted physical contact or abusive or offensive comments of a sexual nature.

The County and its Officials, Volunteers & Coaches will not tolerate bullying in any of its forms during County matches, competitions, coaching or at any other time while under supervision of the County.

5.5.2 We are intent that we will:

- Provide a point of contact where those being bullied can report their concerns in confidence – The County Welfare Officer
- Take the problem seriously
- Investigate any and all incidents and accusations of bullying

- Talk to bullies and their victims separately along with their parents/quardians
- Impose sanctions, which may include expulsion from the county for bullies
- Inform all members of the County about the incident and action taken if appropriate
- Keep a written record of all incidents and the action taken

5.6 Confidentiality

- **5.6.1** Details of all juniors will be kept on file and will not be shared with a third party without parent/guardian consent. Access to this information will be granted to the CWO, the County Junior Organiser(s) and the PGA Golf Professional(s) involved in the County golf. Details will be passed onto WALES GOLF as requested when juniors have reached an ability level that meets the relevant County criteria.
- **5.6.2** All concerns/allegations will be dealt with confidentially by the County and information will only be shared on a need to know basis, either internally or externally depending on the nature/seriousness of the concern/allegation.

5.7 Changing rooms

The changing rooms are used by all members and visitors, juniors will only be supervised if needed at County organised events. Parents will be made aware that adults use the changing rooms throughout the day for changing and showering. Where a parent/guardian does not consent to their child accessing the changing rooms, it is their responsibility to either supervise the child while in the changing rooms or ensure that they do not use them.

Mid Wales County Golf Association - Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy

Code of Conduct for PGA Professionals, Associate Coaches & Volunteers

- Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person within the context of golf
- Treat everyone equally and do not discriminate on the grounds of age, gender, race, religion or belief, sexual orientation or disability
- If you see any form of discrimination, do not condone it or allow it to go unchallenged
- Place the well-being and safety of the young person above the development of performance
- Develop an appropriate working relationship with young people, based on mutual trust and respect
- Ensure that physical contact is appropriate and necessary and is carried out within recommended guidelines with the young person's full consent and approval
- Always work in an open environment (e.g. avoid private or unobserved situations and encourage an open environment)
- Do not engage in any form of sexually related contact with a young player. This
 is strictly forbidden as is sexual innuendo, flirting or inappropriate gestures and
 terms
- You should not have regular contact outside your county role with the juniors and should not engage in regular communication through text, email or social network sites
- Know and understand the Mid Wales County Golf Association Child Safeguarding Policies and Procedures
- Respect young people's opinions when making decisions about their participation in golf
- Inform players and parents of the requirements of golf
- Be aware of and report any conflict of interest as soon as it becomes apparent
- Display high standards of language, manner, punctuality, preparation and presentation

- Do not smoke, drink or use recreational drugs while actively working with young people in the club. This reflects a negative image and could compromise the safety of the young people
- Do not give young people alcohol when they are under the care of the county
- Hold relevant qualifications and insurance cover. All County officials, Volunteers and Coaches who work regularly with children must have current DBS clearance
- Ensure the activities are appropriate for the age, maturity, experience and ability of the individual
- Promote the positive aspects of golf e.g. fair play
- Display high standards of behaviour and appearance
- Follow County Procedures & WALES GOLF Good Practice Guidelines
- Ensure that you attend appropriate training to keep up-to-date with your role and the welfare of young people
- Report any concerns you may have in relation to a child or the behaviour of an adult, following reporting procedures laid down by the Mid Wales County Golf Association

Mid Wales County Golf Association Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy -Code of Conduct for Young Golfers

As a young golfer taking part in a Mid Wales County Golf Association activity, you should:

- Help create and maintain an environment free of fear and harassment
- Demonstrate fair play and apply golf's standards both on and off the course
- Understand that you have the right to be treated as an individual
- Respect the advice that you receive
- Treat others as you would wish to be treated yourself
- Respect other people and their differences
- Look out for yourself and for the welfare of others
- Speak out (to your parents or a club representative) if you consider that you or others have been poorly treated
- Be organised and on time
- Tell someone in authority if you are leaving the venue
- Accept that these guidelines are in place for the well-being of all concerned
- Treat organisers and coaches with respect
- Observe instructions or restrictions requested by the adults looking after you

You should not take part in any irresponsible, abusive, inappropriate or illegal behaviour which includes:

- Smoking
- Using foul language
- Publicly using critical or disrespectful descriptions of others either in person or through text, email or social network sites
- Consuming alcohol, illegal performance-enhancing drugs or stimulants

Mid Wales County Golf Association Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy - Guidance for parents

Mid Wales County Golf Association is delighted to welcome you and your child to what we hope is the first of many events that you will be taking part in.

The positive effect of your support, as a parent, can't be overstated. Your behaviour has a real influence on the way your child experiences golf.

First things first – why is your child showing an interest in the sport? Is it to learn a new game? To hang out with their friends? Because they did it in school and liked it? Or because you play?

Make sure they're playing for their own reasons, not yours.

To enable us to provide the best possible experience for you and your child, we kindly request that you read through the following guidance and complete the attached forms.

- Take an interest in your child's activity and progress and be supportive.
- Familiarise yourself with the Mid Wales County Golf Association Safeguarding Policy (attached).
- Complete the attached Parental Consent Form which will enable event organisers to cater for any particular needs that your child may have (e.g. medical conditions and medications, allergies, learning difficulties etc.), as well as contact you in the unlikely event of an emergency.
- Go through the attached Code of Conduct with your child and return a signed copy to the County Organiser.
- Be punctual when dropping off and picking up your child for and from coaching / events. It is important to communicate with the event organiser if collecting your child after an event, may cause a problem.
- Introduce yourself to the adults involved in the supervision of your child.
- When leaving your child, make sure they have the necessary provisions for the
 day, including the ability to meet the requirements of changing weather conditions.
 Please ensure that your mobile is switched on when you are away from the club, so
 that you can be contacted in an emergency.
- Encourage your child to take part and support County activities such as coaching and competitions.
- Help your child to arrange golf with other juniors away from County organised activities so they have someone to play golf with.

As a parent/guardian you are encouraged to:

- Discuss any concerns regarding the organisation of activities or the behaviour of adults towards your child with the County Welfare Officer, who will treat any concerns you or your child may have in the strictest confidence

Mid Wales County Golf Association Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy - Photography Consent



This form is to be signed by the legal guardian of a child under the age of 18, together with the child. Please note that if you have more than one child registered you will need to complete separate forms for each.

Mid Wales County Golf Association recognises the need to ensure the welfare and safety of all children in golf. As part of our commitment to ensure their safety we will not permit photographs, video images or other images of your child to be taken or used without your consent.

Mid Wales County Golf Association will follow the guidance for the use of images of children as detailed within the respective Child Protection Policy and Procedures.

Mid Wales County Golf Association will take steps to ensure these images are used solely for the purposes for which they are intended i.e. the promotion and celebration of the activities of the County, or for coaching purposes.

If you become aware that these images are being used inappropriately you should inform the County Welfare Officer immediately.

The photographs may be available on the website http://mwcga.co.uk for the golf season. If at any time; either the parent/ guardian or the child wishes the data to be removed from the website, 7 days' notice must be given to the County Welfare Officer after which the data will be removed.

The photographs may also be submitted to the Mid Wales area newspapers. If at any time the parent/guardian or the child does not wish a photograph to be published, 7 days notice must be given to the County Welfare Officer.

Mid Wales County Golf Association Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy - Regulated Activity

DISCLOSURE AND BARRING SERVICE (DBS) ELIGIBILITY FOR CHECKS

The eligibility for requesting DBS checks has changed under recent legislation.

Checks can <u>only</u> be requested if the work that a volunteer or County official does fits within the following definition of "Regulated Activity".

"Regulated activity" is defined as where someone is teaching, training, instructing, caring for or supervising children, or providing advice or guidance on well-being or driving a vehicle only for children, when this activity is done regularly and unsupervised.

"Regularly" is considered to be at least once a week. If the activity was taking place on 4 or more days in a 30 day period, this would also fall within the definition.

If the activity involves **any** overnight responsibility between 2 am and 6 am then this is also classed as Regulated Activity.

Supervision must be by a person who is working in a regulated activity, must be day to day and must be "reasonable in all the circumstances to ensure the protection of children".

"regulated activity" would also cover people involved in transporting children as part of their role on behalf of the club, (not parents or with parental consent).

If the activity meets the requirements of the definition, but is supervised, then the club/county will still be able to request a DBS check but the disclosure information will be limited.

IF THE ROLE DOES NOT MEET THE CRITERIA OF WORKING IN A REGULATED ACTIVITY, WHETHER SUPERVISED OR NOT, YOU MUST NOT APPLY FOR A DBS CHECK
